

Compass Learning Odyssey (Compass)



Compass Learning Odyssey (Compass)

This year your child has begun using Compass Learning Odyssey at school to reinforce skills. Compass Learning Odyssey has been adopted to provide supplemental online digital content for all schools in Lee **《**Compass**Learning**® County, K - 12. You may be familiar with Compass if your child used the program in elementary or middle school, but this is the first year that high schools are able to use the program. Odyssey offers core curriculum courses including math, English Language Arts (ELA), Growth / 100% science and history as well as elective topics and Advanced Placement courses for high school students. Students are given an individualized learning path for remediation and enrichment. All students will be using Compass in school for at least 15 minutes per week in their classes. It is important that students have headphones or earbuds in order to be able to complete their assignments. Our school store sells them during lunch for \$1.00 per pair. Students can log on from any internet connection 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. If you have any questions or would like more information, please contact the school!



FUN IN PHYSICS!

The Naked-Egg Drop Experiment

Students have noticed how a dropped egg will break if it hits a hard surface like the floor, but may not break if the surface is soft like the grass in a yard. Or they may have wondered why a baseball catcher's mitt is thick, but not an infielder's mitt. In physics, they learn that the stopping of a moving object requires both a force and a time to apply that force. The product of the applied force and the stopping time is called the "impulse." As the impulse is the product of the force and the time, the longer the stopping time is, the smaller will be the force needed to stop the object. Since the baseball catcher cannot move backward when he catches the baseball, the mitt is thick to protect his hand. An infielder can move his hand backward as the ball is caught, which increases the time to stop the ball and lessens the force on his hand.

Applying this information to a physics experiment, the students are asked to design a container that will catch a falling raw egg and prevent it from breaking or cracking. The container materials they choose cannot exceed four inches in height – the egg must be stopped by whatever materials the students choose to fill their container with. The egg is dropped from the stands in our football field (about 20 feet above the container). When it reaches the container about one second later, it is moving at about 35 feet per second (about 25 mph), so to catch it safely is quite a challenge!

Students have been successful using marshmallows, layers of sliced bread, dryer lint, and even pillows brought from home! The experiment is great fun, and as the teacher I enjoy the extraordinary creativity they bring to the challenge.



Business Club Prepares for District Leadership Conference

Future Business Leaders of America meet on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month for less than 30 minutes and is open to everyone in the school who is interested in business. Of almost 100 members last year, 70 competed at Districts and all placed. Forty students went to the State Leadership Conference (winning 11 state titles) and eight went to Nationals this summer in Atlanta.

Riverdale FBLA is part of a national organization that boasts a quarter million members. The FBLA point system ensures deserving students will be recognized for their leadership and participation, with cash prizes for those who excel. Members do several fundraisers, some community service and compete in one of 60 topics. Also, students can earn Business Achievement Awards.














Riverdale World Language Department continues strides toward proficiency.

The World Language Department continues to make great strides in creating proficiency based instruction for all students taking World Languages. Lately, Mr. Michael Tony Bourbina has created several instructional digital aides using Socrative.com and Conjuguemos.com. Both of these programs are free programs that allow creation of lessons tailored to the needs of the individual instructor. With Chromebooks now an instructional tool possessed by every student, this allows electronic access to the information highway as well as usage of digital sites designed to engage students in learning activities along their lines of interest. In addition to lessons in Spanish, Mr. Bourbina also is in the process of designing lessons for French. RHS World Language Department is particularly fortune to have such a talented individual on its staff. Congratulations and KUDOS, Mr. Tony Bourbina!

Students in Spanish 3 presented Preterit and Imperfect tenses in Spanish. The group presentations enabled students to model teaching strategies of Spanish as well as their knowledge of the content area. Additionally, students demonstrated their knowledge of how to form commands both formal and informal. The idea was to give students an opportunity to engage in a discussion of the content area as well as to strengthen their knowledge base. Mr. Lillard was very pleased with the presentations and observed that most students had a solid understanding of the concepts presented. Next is to show how to interact in conversation with the learned concepts. The Spanish honors class is geared to have students become proficient in speaking, reading, writing

Students have been working in teams using Google Classroom, Kagan, and WIC-OR Strategies to review the following: culture about Puerto Rico and Spain, present conjugations (ar, er and ir), and stem -changing verbs (e-ie and o-ue). Teams interpreted what their peers were saying as they presented in class. Later, they were provided with a template to fill out and apply what they learned, during this interpretive listening practice.

Ms. Cintron was very proud and excited for all of her students' progress in using on-line resources of Quizlet, Socrative, Conjuguemos and Kahoots. Cintron stated that students are showing basic conversation strategies by working in teams, which leaves no question that they are on the right path to learning the importance of mastering Spanish.

Across the World Language Department students are using Compass Learning, a learning tool which the entire school supports and hopes will motivate all students as they prepare for FSA and all other reading tests. Finally, students are invited to participate in afterschool tutoring activities across the department. All World Language teachers provide afterschool tutoring for their students to increase learning proficiency.














Good News from Athletics






To us, it's not just a matter of semantics. It's a large part of our coaching philosophy. It is critically important that we lay the foundation for the lacrosse PROGRAM from the start and get the program heading in the right direction immediately. We've sought out sponsorship to help buy new equipment for play and conditioning. Most of all, we've worked hard to raise awareness of lacrosse in the Riverdale community.
